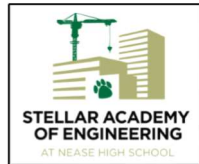

FROM THE WIRED ANCHOR DESK TO NBC



As one of Wired's standout anchors, Clark Fouraker helped to shape the news show as it moved from a weekly series to a daily newscast in 2006. One of the Communications Academy's first graduates, Clark followed his passion for broadcast news beyond high school and made a name for himself in the business. Now, as a new member of the Communications Academy Advisory Board, this NBCLX journalist shares his thoughts on the program and on professional success in the news industry.

You were part of the first graduating class for the Communications Academy. What originally drew you to take the TV Production class?

I wanted an easy class on my schedule ... just kidding! I had an instinct that I would enjoy the creative outlet, I liked the idea of learning a skill (shooting and editing video) and I knew other students who had a lot of fun. It turns out I was right on all three.

Can you share one memory of your time in the Communications Academy that made an impact on your future career?

The Academy had purchased new studio and control room equipment that really allowed our class to reinvent Wired. We were having a blast innovating, and then we had the opportunity to travel to the Student Television Network convention in Anaheim, CA. We quickly realized there was a whole world of our high school peers producing amazing content! The trip was motivating. Our group brought back new skills and new energy to improve the content the Academy produced.

What did you do after high school?

After high school, I attended the University of Florida where I majored in Telecommunication-News. Because of my experience in the Academy and internships arranged by the Academy, I was dead set on working in Television News. I've worked at TV stations in Columbia, South Carolina, Jacksonville (First Coast News) and New York City. Now, I'm a national storyteller for NBCLX, a new broadcast and digital network NBC launched to produced content for Millennials and GenZers.



Now you're part of the Communications Academy Advisory Board. Why did you decide to get involved?

For me, there couldn't be a better way to give back! The Communications Academy really did put me on my career path and gave me the confidence to succeed. It also created opportunities for me to begin building a network of people who worked in the communications industry locally. Those contacts became instrumental when I was looking for someone to edit a resume or provide council on a job decision.

What advice do you have for students who want to go into broadcasting in the future?

I've got two pieces of advice. First, never forget to tell me a story. If you can become a good and reliable storyteller, you'll succeed in the broadcasting industry. Second, start a YouTube channel now. In my opinion, YouTube has changed the industry more than anything else because it erased the barrier for you to create a video and publish it. That means you can start producing and sharing content before college or your first job.

We are so thankful to Clark for taking time to share his story and help inspire the next generation of broadcast journalists!

What students need to complete Scholarship Application:

- Sample of digital media/design or photography, if applicable
