GRANTS

A grant is a form of financial aid that doesn't have to be repaid, unless you withdraw from school and owe a refund.

Examples include:

- Pell Grants
- •Teacher Education Assistance for College and Higher Education (TEACH) Grants

SCHOLARSHIPS

Many nonprofit and private organizations offer scholarships to help students pay for college or career school. This type of free money, which is sometimes based on academic merit, talent, or a particular area of study, can make a real difference in helping you manage your education expenses.

WORK STUDY

The Federal Work-Study Program allows you to earn money to pay for school by working part-time. You'll earn at least the current federal minimum wage. However, you may earn more depending on the type of work you do, and the skills required for the position.

LOANS

A loan is money you borrow and must pay back with interest. If you apply for financial aid, you may be offered loans as part of your school's financial aid offer. When you receive a student loan, you are borrowing money to attend a college or career school. You must repay the loan as well as interest that accrues.

Types of Financial Aid



Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

- Federal government is largest source of student aid;
 FAFSA distributed and processed by the U.S.
 Department of Education
- Manual or electronic options
- o 2025-26 FAFSA **OPENS DECEMBER 1**st, **2024**
- Must be completed ANNUALLY (per academic year) to be evaluated for financial aid

HOW MUCH WILL COLLEGE COST?

A student's financial need is calculated as the difference between the cost of attending the school, the *Cost of Attendance* (COA) minus any expected financial assistance, such as gifts or outside scholarships, and the amount the student and their family is expected to pay, the *Student Aid Index* (SAI)*

COA – SAI* = Student Financial Need

What is Bright Futures Scholarship Program?



Funded by the state of Florida via Florida Lottery



Has three major categories

Florida Academic Scholar (FAS)
Florida Medallion Scholar (FMS)
Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholar



Students must apply by submitting the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31st after high school graduation



Eligibility requirements must be met by graduation, however SAT/ ACT/CLT scores can be acquired through June 30th and submitted through August 31st



Application opens October 1, 2024

Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV) 2023-24

Initial Eligibility Requirements: (As determined by the Florida Department of Education.)

- 1. Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31 after high school graduation.
- 2. Graduate with a standard Florida high school diploma or its equivalent.
- 3. Achieve the required weighted 3.0 GPA in the non-elective high school courses.
- Complete at least 3 full credits in a single Career and Technical Education program.
- Achieve the required minimum 3.5 unweighted GPA in the single Career and Technical Education program.
- Complete at least 30 volunteer service hours, 100 paid work hours, or a combination that equals a minimum of 100 total hours.
- Achieve the required minimum scores on one of the college entrance exams per the chart below no later than August 31 of the year the student graduates from high school.

Volunteer Hours/Paid Work Hours for Bright Futures

- ► Two forms required for paid work hours:
- Service Plan
- 2. Paystub
- Two forms required for volunteer activities:
- 1. Service Plan
- 2. Service Log

Signed letter on the organization's letterhead required for any activities outside of the school describing type of service, who in the community the service benefited and a description of the service event.
