- In your XELLO account, under ABOUT


 ME, click on and complete the LEARNING

- <u>Get involved!</u> Colleges want to see that you have been involved in at least 3 different sports, clubs, or activities. Begin to work on your volunteer hours. We recommend that you complete at least 25 hours by the end of grade 9. Complete the needed Bright Futures paperwork for each volunteer experience and hand in to



SOPHOMORE YEAR CHECKLIST

Sophomore year in high school is a year of exploration and planning. Take these steps to ensure you are giving yourself the best possible chances of success in the IB Program and beyond:

- Log in to your XELLO account. This system
 will be used to organize your pathway to
 graduation. See your Counselor if you are unable
 to log in asap. You log in via your CLEVER school
 account. Look for the XELLO logo.
- In your XELLO account, on the home page, click on <u>Build your resume</u> under your TO-DO list.
 Here you will input experiences, honors, etc and begin to compile data each year that will be used to produce a polished resume for jobs, colleges and scholarships.
- In your XELLO account, under ABOUT ME, click on and complete the <u>MATCHMAKER</u> module. See what careers and majors may best suit what you like and dislike at this stage of high school. Continue to learn about yourself!

Get involved! Colleges want to see that you have been involved in at least 3 different sports, clubs, or activities. Begin to work on your volunteer hours. We recommend that you complete at least 50 hours by the end of grade 10. Complete the needed Reflection Form and verification letter for each volunteer experience and turn in to your Counselor in C Pod so that it can be entered into the Bright Futures system.

When you get your PSAT scores back around January, link your PSAT account/ score report with KHAN Academy using your ACCESS CODE on your score report to receive a free, personalized online SAT prep course.

JUNIOR YEAR CHECKLIST

Junior year in high school is arguably your most important. It is a year filled with excitement and preparation. Take these steps to ensure you are giving yourself the best possible chances of success at getting

in to the school or program of your dreams:

- Create and maintain a student resume using RESUME BUILDER in your XELLO account (log in via CLEVER). This is a MUST if you do not have a resume already. This can be found in your ABOUT ME page. (https://help.xello.world/en-us/Content/ Knowledge-Base/Xello-6-12/Resume-Builder/ Students-Resume-Builder.htm)
- Take an interest inventory to see what career/ field you might best excel based on your skills and interests. These are available in your XELLO account in your ABOUT ME page under MATCHMAKER
- Review your schedule/transcript to ensure that you are taking all the necessary courses needed for admission to colleges on your wish list. Check their admissions page for a list of requirements.


ARE YOU READY FOR THE NEXT
STEP?? PREPARE NOW!

- Get involved! Schools want to see that you have been involved in at least 3 different sports, clubs, or activities. Add them to your student resume in XELLO. Keep adding volunteer hours whenever possible. You need at least 100 hours for Bright Futures.
- **Prepare for the college aptitude tests**. I recommend you take the SAT and/or ACT in the spring of your junior year (see left) if you have not already earned a score that you like.

Here are some things that you should be thinking about now if you want to give yourself the best shot at getting into a college, university or program of your choice. <u>BE PREPARED...</u>

You will need at least 2 letters of recommendation for your college applications. Begin to think about which teachers you will ask. KNOW YOUR AUDIENCE. (example: If you want to get into Engineering/STEM programs, you should be asking your Math and Science teachers for a letter. If you want to get into Journalism programs, you should be asking your English teachers). Target your activities and recommendations to best support your application for admission to that type of program. Plan with purpose.



- •Request letters of recommendation from teachers. Start to request letters of recommendation after Aug 1 of your senior year (see instructions for XELLO/Common Application which are posted in Schoology)

Please follow this schedule to give yourself the BEST possible chance at getting into the college/school/job of your choice after High School.

FIRST STEPS BELOW:


Sign up and take the SAT REASONING TEST or ACT TEST this fall, if needed

Go to www.collegeboard.org or www.actstudent.org and use a credit

- card to register online. BE AWARE OF REGISTRATION DEADLINES. (CLT and PERT are also options for some schools)
- Email a copy of your resume to your Counselor. Your highlights on your resume will be used in the SCHOOL COUNSELOR REPORT that is sent to all of your colleges that require it as part of your application.
- Review your transcript in HAC to be sure that there are no omissions or errors that you see.
- Narrow down your college/school/career list. You should have at least one REACH school (your dream-probably a school that would be difficult for you to get in, but you would love to go to!). You should have 3-4 schools that you feel you would meet their criteria for acceptance (i.e. SAT/ACT scores, GPA, and class rank). Finally, have at least one school that you are quite sure you would get into (your SAFETY school). Be sure that you would be happy to go to any of these schools on your list if they are the only one you get in to. Don't apply to a school unless you really would go. This stuff isn't cheap!
- Whenever possible, take a trip to these schools on your list and visit! The best way to check out a school is in person. Talk to students there. They will give you the scoop on the place-stuff that is not in the books or school websites. Do some research. If you are planning on going right into the job market, visit a business and talk to people that are doing the job that you want to get into.
- On to the selected schools' websites (Just log-in to your XELLO homepage and go to EXPLORE/COLLEGES. You can then search the school and all of their information will pop up!). Most schools now want you to apply online either through Common Application or directly on their website with their specific application. Look over their application requirements and make a list of things you will need when it comes time to apply when school starts in the Fall.

<u>Initial Eligibility Requirements</u>: (As determined by the Florida Department of Education)

- 1. Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31 after high school graduation.
- 2. Graduate from a Florida high school with a standard high school diploma or its equivalent.
- 3. Complete the 16 college-preparatory courses required for admission to a state university.
- 4. Achieve the required weighted GPA in the 16 college-preparatory courses per the chart below.
- 5. Achieve the required composite ACT* score, Overall Score on the Classic Learning Test (CLT*), or combined SAT* score. Tests must be taken no later than August 31 of the student's graduation year (or through January 31 for mid-year graduates), per the chart below.
- 6. Complete the required number of volunteer service hours, paid work hours, or 100 total combined hours per the chart below.

- 3. Enroll as a degree- or certificate-seeking student at a Florida institution in at least 6 non-remedial semester credit hours.

Renewal Requirements: (As determined by grade and hours submitted by the postsecondary institution)

- 1. Students must earn the number of credit hours based on the student's enrollment type per term.
- 2. The renewal cumulative GPA requirements are outlined in the table below.

Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV) 2025-26

<u>Initial Eligibility Requirements</u>: (As determined by the Florida Department of Education.)

- 1. Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31 after high school graduation.
- 2. Graduate with a standard Florida high school diploma or its equivalent.
- 3. Achieve the required weighted 3.0 GPA in the non-elective high school courses.
- 4. Completes at least three (3) full Career and Technical Education credits
- 5. Achieve the required minimum 3.5 unweighted GPA in Career and Technical Education credits.
- 6. Complete at least 30 volunteer service hours, 100 paid work hours, or a combination that equals a minimum of 100 total hours. For students entering grade 9 in the 2024-2025 school year and thereafter, 75 hours of volunteer service must be completed.
- 7. Achieve the required minimum scores on one of the college entrance exams per the chart below no later than August 31 of the year the student graduates from high school.

Requirements to Receive an Award: (As determined by your postsecondary institution.)

- 1. Be evaluated by the Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) as meeting initial eligibility requirements.
- 2. Be a Florida resident and U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen.
- 3. Enroll as a degree- or certificate-seeking student at a Florida institution in at least six (6) non-remedial semester credit hours.

Scholarship Restrictions:

The GSV award may only be used at postsecondary institutions that offer an applied technology diploma, technical degree education program (associate in applied science or associate in science), or a career certificate program and not toward the completion of an associate in arts or a baccalaureate degree.

Renewal Requirements: (As determined by grade and hours submitted by your postsecondary institution.)

- 1. Students must earn the number of credit hours based on the student's enrollment type per term.
- 2. Students must maintain a minimum cumulative 2.75 GPA (unrounded and unweighted).






